He had an especial talent for composing those love songs which the troubadours and their joglars brought to the world. The Provencal school had declined since the end of the 13th century, but its influence reigned for a long time in the palace of Alphonse V at Milan, where that king spent his exile. In Italy Petrarch was the most illustrious representative of this conventional lyricism, and he had many imitators. As has been pointed out, Ragusa had too extended a commerce and too intimate relationships with distant countries to remain untouched by foreign customs and civilizations.
